



THE JASON W. STREVELL HOUSE

401 W. Livingston - The only remaining house in Livingston County where Abraham Lincoln spent considerable time. Home of local politician and lawyer, Jason Strevell. Currently being restored to its 1860 configuration and condition.



THE YOST HOUSE MUSEUM

298 W. Water - A 19th century, Queen-Anne style home with original family furnishings dating back to the 1870s. Art shows at selected times of the year. Open for docent-led tours by appointment.



THE JONES HOUSE

314 E. Madison - Pontiac's oldest remaining brick home. Built in 1858, this home is on the National Register of Historic Places, and is open for guided tours by appointment.

WALLD OG MURAL AND SIGN ART EXHIBIT

Situated in the Pontiac Museum Complex, the Walldog Mural and Sign Art exhibit is dedicated to the history and preservation of wall and barn advertising, as well as modern outdoor painted murals. Videos, artifacts, and original art designs trace the development of this unique craft. Learn about the Walldogs - past and present.

THE BOB WALDMIRE EXPERIENCE

Bob Waldmire was one of the most loved people who made Route 66 part of their personal histories. Bob spent most of his adult life as an itinerant artist, traveling up and down America's Main Street. See examples of Bob's highly original art, learn about his unusual lifestyle, and experience Route 66 through the eyes and art of this icon of the Mother Road.

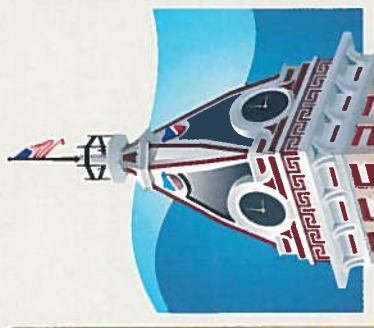
MUSIC OF THE CIVIL WAR EXHIBIT

The Society of Gilders is an international organization dedicated to the past, present, and future of gold and precious metal leaf gilding. Used since the time of the ancient Egyptian pharaohs, gilding in architecture and decoration still stands as one of man's most beautiful crafts. The museum features examples of gilding as well as the Swift Collection that shows how gold leaf is created.

A museum designed to honor the men and women of Livingston County who have faithfully and bravely served in all branches of the American Armed Forces. Ranging from World War I to the present, the articles on display tell the entire history of our citizen soldiers.
